STEP 2: Outline the aims of the proposal

11. What are the main aims of the proposal?

The Proposed Plan is a major step in the preparation of the Aberdeen Local Development Plan which, once adopted, will replace the current Aberdeen Local Development Plan (2012). The existing Local Development Plan makes provision for new development up to 2026 and will show indicatively where development may take place up to 2035. While many of its aims and policies remain sound, it now needs to be updated. The reviewed Local Development Plan will deal in detail with development in the period up to 2035.

The Proposed Plan also sets out our vision for the future development of Aberdeen to

2035 and the planning policies and proposals which will help us achieve our aims. In doing this we have looked at Aberdeen's role within a Scottish context, as set out in the Scottish Government's National Planning Framework, and we have addressed the city's contribution to the future development needs of the north east as required by the Aberdeen City and Shire Strategic Development Plan which was approved in March 2014.

Consultation	Public Drop-in Events The Local Development Plan team organised nine drop-in events across the City inviting members of the public to put their views across on the Main Issues Report. These have helped draft the Proposed Plan.
	Workshops were all held in public buildings which were accessible to all such as libraries, sports facilities, shopping centres and community centres.
	Community Councils, Key Agencies and those who had previously been involved in the Aberdeen Local Development Plan process were invited to the events.
	We advertised the events to the public in a number of ways including newspaper articles before the events, a statutory newspaper advert, a radio advert, posters in the local libraries, supermarkets, NHS facilities, community centres and Sport Aberdeen facilities across the city, information on the Council website and the City Centre Pillars.

Posters were also sent to Community Councils to distribute around their community.

Some meetings were better attended than others, however many interesting comments and issues were raised by the public regarding the Main Issues Report.

Retail in the City Centre Workshop

A workshop focussing on retail in the City Centre was held in Marischal College with Councillors, members of the City Centre business community and City Centre community groups invited. The session consisted of a presentation outlining the Aberdeen Local Development Plan - Main Issues Report by a member of the Local Development Plan team and then a presentation by Keith Hargest on the Aberdeen City and Aberdeenshire Retail Study (2013) and its implications for Aberdeen City Centre. Youth Engagement

The aim of our Youth Engagement Programme has been to promote the important role young people can play in looking into the future of places and expressing how they think they should be designed and planned. We wrote to every secondary school in the city to invite them to take part in our Youth Engagement Programme. This was very successful with seven schools signing up. Questionnaires / Representations

The Local Development Plan team also designed a questionnaire that was made available on the web and in paper that gave the opportunity to comment on the main planning issues the city faces. Paper copies were sent round the local libraries and were made available in Marischal College and at the consultation workshops we held. The publication of the Proposed Aberdeen Local Development is an invitation for **all** groups to engage with planning issues within Aberdeen. Once we publish the Plan we will arrange consultation to ensure that the comments we receive are representative and to reach out to groups that are sometimes hard to reach, and those that have not yet been represented in our consultation events.

Our assessment of sites and policy issues has been informed by research into established and predicted needs. Some of this research, such as the Housing Need and Demand Assessment which has provided the evidence base for setting the level of affordable housing expected in new developments. The Proposed Plan ensures that new developments contain local facilities and services wherever possible and are not car dependent, but prioritise walking, cycling and public transport.

The purpose of the publication of the Proposed Aberdeen Local Development Plan is to enable interested individuals and groups to make representations on the spatial strategy and policy issues affecting the future of the City. Any representations submitted to the Council will be summarised, and a Council response will be prepared. This will be sent on to Scottish Ministers who will appoint an independent person (often called a Reporter) to examine the Proposed Plan, in particular any unresolved representations. The Reporter will then ask the Council to supply him or her with the

summary of unresolved issues, copies of unresolved representations and any other supporting documents or productions. The Reporter will decide whether a Public Examination will be required and what form it will take. Most issues are expected to be handled without the need for further information, but where additional evidence is requested, this will normally be in written form. Where a face-to-face meeting is required, this will normally take the form of a discussion with questions led by the Reporter (this is often called a hearing). Only in exceptional circumstances will a formal inquiry be necessary to test information through cross —examination.
