

Integrated Impact Assessment

The purpose of Aberdeen City Council is to protect the people and the place of Aberdeen from harm, enabling them to prosper and supporting them in the event of harm happening.

The purpose of an Integrated Impact Assessment is to evidence that Aberdeen City Council are making decisions in an informed way, and that the impact of decisions made is understood and accepted. The legislation that is considered within this assessment are:

1. About the Policy

1.1 Title

Close and Sell Park & Ride Sites.

1.2 What does this policy seek to achieve?

Indicative savings of £67,000 (2024/25) and £168,000 (2025/26) from operation, maintenance and utility costs of providing Park & Ride (P&R) sites.

The proposal intends to achieve budget savings by closing the P&R sites and making income from selling the land.

To not provide this service would be contrary to the Local Transport Strategy, Bus Alliance Objectives and would be counter-productive in the promotion of bus use and work towards Net-Zero. This would represent a considerable deviation from existing policy and strategy. There could also be unintended consequences on existing bus services as a result in lost patronage and revenue from no longer being able to serve a P&R site.

High risk to strategic and medium risk to reputational. Such a move is not in line with National, Regional or Local Transport Strategies and would be counterproductive in long term objectives, via Bus Alliance for increase in Public Transport and Park & Ride use and modal shift from private car, including provision of Aberdeen Rapid Transit.

Review of Local Transport Strategy.

Data from the phase 2 consultation process has been reviewed and the option is clearly unpopular with the citizens of Aberdeen due to concerns around environmental outcomes and suggestions on increasing the use of park and ride facilities.

There were no clear links to protected characteristics identified in our review of the consultation responses.

What consultation and engagement and has been undertaken with officers and partner organisations?

Chief Officers from all other services have had sight of all budget options being put forward.

What consultation and engagement and has been undertaken with people who may be impacted by this policy (e.g. citizens, community groups, or other people/groups)?

Aberdeen City Council launched a three-part public consultation around the 2024/25 Budget and future spending plans from July 2023 to January 2024. In part 1, which ran throughout July 2023, people were asked to award points across different service areas to indicate where they thought the council's spending priorities should be. In part 2, the public could either increase, decrease or not change the level of expenditure in areas listed. In part 3, which took place throughout January 2024, there were two face to face sessions for the public to attend and an online consultation. There were 3,179 responses to part 1, 2,564 responses to part 2 and 285 responses to part 3. Included in all parts of the consultation was a specific question regarding the proposal to Close and Sell Park & Ride Sites.

In part 2, 59% of respondents wanted no reduction in expenditure, with only 15% in favour of a 50% reduction and 26% in favour of a 100% reduction.

There were few positive comments received in part 3 with all commentary being against the proposal proceeding, with a selection of comments below:

"closing of park and ride sites will affect outdoor activities."

"Removal of bus shelters and park&ride waiting areas may also leave women feeling less safe."

"Do away with park and ride as many are barely used."

"Without knowing the effect of the closure of the three park and ride sites mentioned would have on the traffic volume and resulting congestion, it is difficult to say what effect this will have on disabled and elderly people."

5: Children and Young People's Rights Impacts

The United Nations Convention has 54 articles that cover all aspects of a child's life and set out the civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights that all children everywhere are entitled to. It also explains how adults and governments must work together to make sure all children can enjoy all their rights.

Children's rights apply to every child/young person under the age of 18 and to adults still eligible to receive a "children's service" (e.g. care leavers aged 18 – 25 years old).

The Conventions are also known as the "General Principles" and they help to interpret all the other articles and play a fundamental role in realising all the rights in the Convention for all children. They are:

- 1. Non-discrimination (Article 2)
- 2. Best interest of the child (Article 3)
- 3. Right to life survival and development (Article 6)
- 4. Right to be heard (Article 12)
