Close Pets Corner at Hazelhead Park

1.2 What does this policy seek to achieve?

Close Pets Corner. The policy would see Pets Corner closed. The public would no longer have access and school clubs and events would no longer have use of the space. Staff would be redeployed / made redundant. Significant capital funding was invested in the facility a few years ago and this helped Pets Corner become a very popular attraction for visitors to Hazlehead Park. Closure would see the loss of buy in from Friends groups who have raised money for the facility. The service will have to rehouse all animals. The Education Centre used by Early Years team for Breakfast clubs and After School clubs would not be available. Saving does not include rates.

2.2 In what way will the policy impact people with these protected characteristics?

Pets Corner is an important attractions for visitors and residents alike. As park of Hazlehead Park it is seen as an essential attraction for people to enjoy nature, exercise, socialize, and escape from everyday problems.

It is particularly important for families with young children.

The breakfast clubs and after school clubs make use of Pets Corner five days a week.

Pets Corner is also used for events and as a meeting space. This brings in income.

With the closure of Doonies Farm in 2023 there is no other similar attraction left in the city. Pets Corners give a very special experience to groups of people such as children with autism. The petting of animals and closeness that children get to a variety of animals is a benefit to everyone involved.

2.3 What considerations have been made in reaching the above assessment?

Service data and budget information.

Data from the phase 2 budget consultation process has been reviewed and the option is clearly unpopular with the citizens of Aberdeen. A large majority of people opposed the idea of closing down the Pets Corner, arguing that they are important attractions for visitors and residents alike.

Pets Corner had more than 50,000 visitors last year and the numbers are expected to grow. The tickets sales are getting very close to ensuring that Pets Corner covers all its costs.

There were no additional concerns for impacts on people with protected characteristics.

What consultation and engagement and has been undertaken with officers and partner organisations?

Chief Officers from all other services have had sight of all budget options being put forward.

What consultation and engagement and has been undertaken with people who may be impacted by this policy (e.g. citizens, community groups, or other people/groups)?

Aberdeen City Council launched a three-part public consultation around the 2024/25 Budget and future spending plans from July 2023 to January 2024. In part 1, which ran throughout July 2023, people were asked to award points across different service areas to indicate where they thought the council's spending priorities should be. In part 2, the public could either increase, decrease or not change the level of expenditure in areas listed. In part 3, which took place throughout January 2024, there were two face to face sessions for the public to attend and an online consultation. There were 3,179 responses to part 1, 2,564 responses to part 2 and 285 responses to part 3. Included in all parts of the consultation was a specific question regarding the closing of Perts Corner.

81% of the respondents were against the closure of Pets Corner. A large majority of people opposed the idea of closing Pets Corner, arguing that it is an important attraction for visitors and residents alike.

From part 3 of the consultation process, there were a number of specific comments on the proposed closure. These stated,

"You can not close the pets corner or the winter gardens. My asn child who cannot attend normal extra activities outside school, loves attending these places and with all this funding cuts which are being proposed I would seriously think about moving me and my children out of this city to give them a better life. Where they can enjoy places and charities who give a safe space without the worry of the council who we pay tax too! To take it all away!!"

"Terrible proposals for the reasons I have mentioned previously - less visitors and tourists, less events and therefore less economic spend in Aberdeen City. Less opportunities for kids, youth and school groups which will impact the children of Aberdeen negatively and will have a huge negative impact on children and parent's (particularly women's) mental health. Children and young people are more likely to engage in anti-social and criminal behaviour if there are no other options and these proposed cuts are taking away any such options."

5: Children and Young People's Rights Impacts

The United Nations Convention has 54 articles that cover all aspects of a child's life and set out the civil, political, economic, social, and cultural rights that all children everywhere are entitled to. It also explains how adults and governments must work together to make sure all children can enjoy all their rights.

Children's rights apply to every child/young person under the age of 18 and to adults still eligible to receive a "children's service" (e.g. care leavers aged 18 – 25 years old).

The Conventions are also known as the "General Principles" and they help to interpret all the other articles and play a fundamental role in realising all the rights in the Convention for all children. They are:

- 1. Non-discrimination (Article 2)
- 2. Best interest of the child (Article 3)
- 3. Right to life survival and development (Article 6)
- 4. Right to be heard (Article 12)
