2.4 What mitigations can be put in place?

What mitigations are there against any negative impacts (if applicable)?

Alternative modes of travel, either active, public transport or car club vehicles, are available through the operational hours of a controlled parking zone. Outwith the hours of the CPZ operation, parking is available free of charge to all. Parking is also free of charge at the periphery of the controlled parking zones areas.

The possibility of exploring a 'Carer permit' option could be considered; albeit, if progressed, this would require an amendment to Traffic Regulation Orders, which could take in the region of 9 to 12 months.

For those with disabilities, there is the 'Blue Badge' parking scheme, that beyond providing 'close proximity' parking opportunities in dedicated bays, provides an exemption from any charges associated with general on-street 'permit / pay & display / voucher' parking bays established by the Council.

This proposal will impact on low-income households who wish to park their car within a controlled parking zone where they live or are visiting. Drivers can also park on the network outwith the controlled parking zones though this may mean a further trip on foot, cycle or bus to return home. Active and public transport options are also available.

5: Children and Young People’s Rights Impacts

The United Nations Convention has 54 articles that cover all aspects of a child’s life and set out the civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights that all children everywhere are entitled to. It also explains how adults and governments must work together to make sure all children can enjoy all their rights.

Children’s rights apply to every child/young person under the age of 18 and to adults still eligible to receive a “children’s service” (e.g. care leavers aged 18 – 25 years old).

The Conventions are also known as the “General Principles” and they help to interpret all the other articles and play a fundamental role in realising all the rights in the Convention for all children. They are:

1. Non-discrimination (Article 2)
2. Best interest of the child (Article 3)
3. Right to life survival and development (Article 6)
4. Right to be heard (Article 12)
